Enjoy an evening out at the Colorado Center for the Blind and help support the CCB Youth Services Programs.



FREE CURRENCY IDENTIFIERS

During a four month pilot project (beginning September 2nd) the U.S. Bureau of Engraving, will be offering patrons of the National Library Service a free money identifier. To receive a currency reader call 1-888-657-7323. After confirming the library account information, a currency reader will be delivered to the address on file. Shipment of the currency readers will begin in January, 2015.



FINGER READER



From U.S. News and World Report: Scientists at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology are developing an affordable finger reader for people whose vision is impaired. The prototype FingerReader fits like a ring on a user's index finger. A small camera scans text as the finger moves across the print. Special software processes scanned words and a synthesized voice reads the text aloud. The device also has vibration motors and other cues to help users read in a straight line. IFIDGET: IPHONE APP TO HELP BLIND PEOPLE CORRECT ROCKING

An app for the iPhone developed by Tyler K. Thompson, an assistive technology teacher in New Mexico, uses the iPhone's gyroscope to alert students when they rock back and forth. The app works by vibrating when it senses rocking movements. Future versions of the app may be able to use a wristwatch running iOS (rumored to be in production by Apple). By recording certain hand movements, this app could help with things like eye poking, wrist flapping, bouncing, hand position while reading braille, or even cane technique.
