

BRAILLE-IENS


Some folks suspected the earth had been visited by aliens (or perhaps we should call them "Braille-iens") when a mysterious crop circle depicting a message in Braille appeared in a California barley field last month. The crop circle south of San Francisco contained a stylized image of a computer chip design and the number "192" in Braille repeated 6 times. Hundreds of locals and news crews flocked to the site before it was plowed under by the farmer, who was not happy to have gawkers trampling his fields. The publisher of *Skeptics* Magazine was quoted as saying: "We have to make a choice: what's more likely? That aliens landed in Chualar, California, or that a couple of pranksters made it?"

The mystery was solved several days later when the Nvidia Corporation, a technology

company based in Santa Clara, California introduced the Tegra K1, a new chip for tablets and smartphones that contains 192 computing "cores". With only a very limited marketing budget, the company wanted to promote the chip prior to the **International Consumer** Electronics Show in Las Vegas. They definitely succeeded in getting attention, with national news coverage and YouTube exposure that went viral. We're not sure how the "192" was received at the Electronics Show, but we're happy they chose to use Braille in their stunt!
