SPELLING DICTIONARY HELPS KIDS WITH NEW BRAILLE CODE

Changes to the Braille code are here. UEB or Unified English Braille, is taking the place of EBAE, English Braille American Edition. Most of the English speaking nations of the world have adopted the new code so that Braille will no longer vary from one country to the next. The changes are taking place in order to (among other things) allow for the addition of new symbols and make computer translation of print to Braille more accurate. In the new code the alphabet and numbers stay the same. However, nine contractions have been completely eliminated and some of the remaining contractions are used more often in their place. There also

have been some changes to punctuation.

National Braille Press has stepped up to help kids meet the challenge of change. They recently published a spelling dictionary for elementary age students transitioning to and newly learning the UEB Braille code. It includes 1400 elementary-level words, listed alphabetically without definitions, enabling elementary school-age children to look up the spelling of words independently. Both the contracted and uncontracted Braille version of each word is given. The new edition is in print/Braille, so sighted and blind children and teachers or parents can use it together. \$15.00 from National Braille Press.

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ACCESSIBLE BULLETIN BOARDS

Bulletin Boards are a lively and engaging feature found in most elementary school classrooms. But for the most part blind and low vision students are left out. There are many ways that classroom bulletin boards can be made appealing to both blind and sighted viewers. Accessible bulletin boards can incorporate Braille alongside print and tactile elements. Real objects, such as candy, jewelry, leaves or any object that fits the theme, can be used to encourage children to touch. Different textured materials like sandpaper, foam cutouts, foil and cardboard can be cut and folded into any shape to give otherwise flat graphics a dimensional characteristic.



Here's an example of an accessible bulletin board that is available for purchase as a kit! This kit contains: 26 movable Braille letter butterflies, Velcro for attaching butterflies to board, Velcro strip (to form words at bottom of board), border, a tactile tree and leaves for the tree, spring stickers, butterfly net, caterpillar Braille cell, die cut letters to form title, directions for creating the board in print/Braille and 8 x 10 color photo of the sample board.
