THE 59TH ANNUAL NFB OF COLORADO STATE CONVENTION

The National Federation of the Blind of Colorado (NFBCO) will hold its 59th annual state convention October 18-21, 2013, at the Colorado Springs Marriott Hotel at 5580 Tech Center Drive in Colorado Springs. Convention activities will get underway on Thursday afternoon, October 18, at 2:00 p.m. with a self-advocacy and self defense workshop. Exhibits of products and services will open on Friday morning at 8:00 a.m. The Friday general session beginning at 11:00 a.m. will have everyone seated together in the convention hall to hear about the NFB in action and enjoy a luncheon. Following lunch, the afternoon will focus on wellness, fitness and nutrition, with emphasis on

sports and recreation activities for blind and visually impaired people. We will re-convene for a general session from 4:30-5:30 p.m. Friday evening will include the resolutions meeting, where the priorities for the actions of the NFBCO in the upcoming year are presented. There will be a social gathering Friday evening with hors d'oeuvres and cash bar. The Friday evening event is a Western theme and there will be prizes for the best Western costume.

On Saturday morning a general session will begin at 9:00 a.m. Just after noon participants will pick up their box lunches and make their way to the breakout sessions for various divisions and interest groups. Our Parents of Blind Children group will meet while the children are engaged in a fun afternoon of creativity and exploration. The older kids will be making compasses and using them to navigate on a scavenger hunt in the hotel. The younger kids will work with tactile artist, Ann Cunningham, in creating their own tactile maps.

The Saturday evening banquet is always a highlight of the

weekend. The banquet keynote address will be given by the NFB national representative, Carl Jacobsen, NFB of New York president. The convention will conclude on Sunday at noon following a morning of substantive discussions plus a business meeting open to all.

Of course conventions are not all business. There will be some lively entertainment along the way, including a huge auction of hotel packages, restaurant certificates and more. But most of all the NFB State Convention is the place to meet others. You'll meet other parents, your kids will meet other blind and visually impaired kids, and we will all meet blind adults who have regular jobs and families and inspire us to see that life as a blind person can be as fulfilling and "normal" as any American life. That's what it's all about. So, come make some friends, laugh...and learn a thing or two! You'll be so happy you did.

Before October 4 (October 3 deadline) registration costs are \$15 for convention registration, \$15 for lunches, and \$30 for the banquet. After October 3 it will cost you \$20 for registration, \$20.00 on each of

the lunches and \$40 for the banquet.




