TRANSITIONING INTO THE FUTURE

Saturday, October 31 1:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m.

With the help of experts in the field, we will be looking at what it takes for blind and visually impaired kids to successfully transition at all ages. We will look at the move from preschool to the mainstream, from middle school to high school, from an IEP to a plan for employment. We'll talk about other transitions as well, such as the move from the school system to vocational rehabilitation services and the move to the new UEB Braille code.

WHY LEARNING TO USE JAWS* IS SO IMPORTANT

(*JAWS is a computer screen reading program for Windows)

Here is a letter from the parent of a blind teen posted on blindkid@nfbnet.org. Read her post and consider...is a technology assessment in order for your child?

"In middle school my daughter had a Braille Note which she did most her work on. She used the Perkins Brailler to do math. She did a little computer work with JAWS, but just the very basics. I got excited when the iPad came out with Voice Over and iOS, which she quickly learned on her own. We thought this would be good and sufficient. She was keeping up and moving forward, her teachers and school were happy with what she was doing. However, in the middle of 7th grade, I asked my daughter what the rest of the class was working on, and she said "oh they are all doing a power point presentation, but I can do something else instead." This was a big red light for me. I started questioning "why at this technology age would she not be able to do the same", I got onto a guest and I found our schools curriculum on the schools website and started comparing what others were

doing to what she was able to do. After a technology assessment, which I requested, it was clear she was not up to par with her peers. "

[After research, Heidi connected with Dr. Denise Robinson who convinced her that her daughter needed full training in using JAWS to access the potential of a standard laptop computer. The school approved lessons with Dr. Robinson on using JAWS. The school TVI also received further JAWS training.]

"Fast forward to 10th grade now, she does "ALL" her work on her laptop--math (plots, lines...etc), English, biology, does beautiful power point presentations, inserts pictures, music, gets her homework from the school learning platform "Canvas", sends in her work via email, and receives work from her teachers by email. She does all the same work as her peers, and I mean all the same!

[After becoming competent in using JAWS] the world opened up for her in ways we never imagined. She will go to college and use all the skills she has learned and is still learning, to be completely independent. A Braille Note and an iPad will not make it for our kids' independence in the future. I hope this starts a conversation about the need for more training in the technology age for VI's and our kids. ...Heidi"
