WANTED: PARENTS AND BLIND KIDS AT NFBCO CHAPTER MEETINGS!

If you are reading this newsletter, chances are your child, or a child you know, is (choose whatever term you like to use): blind, legally blind, low vision, partially sighted, visually impaired, sight impaired, visually challenged...I'm sure the list of possibilities goes on and on. No matter what degree of legal blindness applies, the National Federation of the Blind is the organization representing the rights of your child, now and into adulthood. Perhaps you thought the NFB was for adult blind people. The fact is the NFB is made up of blind and sighted people of all ages working together to identify and confront latent (and sometimes not so latent) discrimination against blind persons, no matter which of the above definitions you use. What kinds of discrimination

are we talking about? Here are a few examples:

Problem: E-readers (Kindles and Nooks) are being distributed to schools for students to use for all textbook reading. The e-Readers are not fully accessible for non-visual access ...The NFB is on the case!

Problem: Computerized standardized tests are being designed so that depending on the student's answers to questions, the test will be customized to that individual. These tests are not accessible to students using screen readers...The NFB is on the case!

Problem: Bus drivers often fail to announce the stops even when a request has been made by a rider, causing the rider to go many blocks beyond his destination...The NFB is on the case, pushing RTD to install automatic announcement technology.

These are just a few of the issues that the NFB works on which will benefit your child sometime in the future. The NFB wants parents to be involved in this work...to help



TO THE MALL AND BEYOND...

Most sighted people have no idea how a blind person can manage to live independently. Blind people who travel, shop and manage their homes are often termed "amazing" by the general public. Although some non-visual techniques are taught to blind children in school and at home, what can't be taught is confidence. Confidence is gained by practice, experience and association with blind adults who demonstrate that "where there's a will, there's a way". Most teenagers cannot wait to be old enough to get a driver’s license. Blind teens, on the other hand, have to resign themselves to riding shotgun with their friends. BUT WAIT! Here’s a chance for your blind high school son or daughter to drive a car! MasterDrive, a company recognized for its driver’s training for teens, is ready to teach blind high school age kids to drive! There will be a classroom session to learn about driving and handling a car. Then it’s out to a parking lot where the blind student drivers will have the opportunity to negotiate an obstacle course. Once the basic driving skills are mastered, the drivers will get to recover from a skid on the specially designed asphalt surface. How cool is that?
